This is task No. 1 to be sorted by the Commission and diocesan authorities.

Please be patient with me and gentle with your advice. I look forward to being more actively involved in the Gospel message of Justice and Peace in our world.

Valedictory Note

Back in 2001, you will recall that in response to a lay initiative and as part of the pastoral reorganisation of the Archdiocese, the Cardinal asked Bishop O'Brien to accept responsibility for Justice and Peace as part of his departmental duties. A think-tank was convened to consider how best to promote Justice and Peace issues within the diocese. Its recommendations resulted in yours truly being appointed as Justice and Peace Co-ordinator and at the same time operating as Parish Priest of Warwick Street, effective from September 2002 and also the establishment of a Diocesan Justice and Peace Commission effective from April 2003, with Liz Steward joining me as part-time Support Worker.

Our main objective was that J&P should be an integral part of the activity of every parish in the diocese and in that I think we have made considerable progress with most of the parishes now engaged in some form of J&P activity, whether through CAFOD (with those Regional Office we have very close links) or through Fair Trade or through some form of campaigning or fundraising activity.

In the last few months we have been involved with preparation of material for Series V of the 'At Your Word, Lord' programme and particularly with the 'Action Pack' which it is hoped will help promote J&P activity in the future.

The last year has also involved a considerable amount of activity in relation to the Make Poverty History programme.

It was always recognised that my appointment as J&P Co-ordinator would be a short-term one, and now seems a good time to hand over. I have in fact had some kind of involvement with Justice and Peace ever since 1979 when I joined the Executive of CIIR, and of course my involvement includes 5 years as Assistant General Secretary of the Bishops Conference working full-time on International Affairs. I am sure that that involvement will continue, as my passion regarding Justice and Peace issues remains undiminished.

Meanwhile, I wish Fr. Joe Ryan well in his new role and promise my every support.

Peace Matters

Thank you to everyone who contributed to the success of the Commission's annual event on 12th November.

We would especially like to thank Pat Gaffney, General Secretary of Pax Christi, our keynote speaker, for taking the time to help plan the programme and for her challenging and inspirational remarks on the day.

Pat called for the creation of a 'culture of Christian citizenship', based on peace and non-violence. Drawing attention to the contrast between worldwide military expenditure, currently around \$975 billion a year, and the UN Millennium Development Goals of \$50 billion, she said that this disparity of expenditure was one of the main obstacles to creating a peaceful world.

We were challenged to "expose the link between issues of security, poverty and injustice and to reject models of security that rest on coercion, pre-emptive violence, the strength of arms, the demonisation and exclusion of the other." Pat also posed the question: "How seriously

do we take our Christian Citizenship? In a society where the voice of Christ is so often stifled and where the state seeks to 'normalise what is really abnormal and unacceptable in human terms'."

During the afternoon we watched a 10-minute video "Where is Love" made by a Docklands Youth Group. Their school is next to the site of the Excel Annual Arms Fair and the young people interviewed one of the Excel executives. They wouldn't be fobbed off and made him answer some awkward questions! It was also interesting to hear from Rev. William Campbell Taylor, of the Diocese of London, about the work at St. Ethelburga's Centre for Peace and Reconciliation, particularly the inter-faith activities there.

Many of you said you enjoyed the group discussion sessions with the opportunity to meet others and share



ideas and perspectives. We will be sure to include these sessions in future events.

Lastly, but certainly not least, thank you to those who helped with the technical set-up and to Network members who helped on the day.

Look forward to meeting many of you again in 2006.

Around the Networks

West London J&P Network

As we move from one year to the next, it is right that we look back as well as forward. When one thinks of 2005, it is hard to remember a year so full of promise and of achievement, even though the achievements may not have been altogether what we had expected or even planned for.

It was a year - we had been forewarned - of unparalleled influence for Britain as for 6 months it held the chair of both the European Union and the G8 group of countries. It was also a year in which Britain had a government (re-elected during the year) that wore its heart on its sleeve and advocated with unprecedented vigour policies intended to improve the economic position of developing countries, and particularly the highly indebted poor countries in Africa. Much of the motivation supplied by those political Policies was supplied by a new phenomenon, the coming together of a national coalition of agencies, including CAFOD, Progressio and Christian Aid, environmental organisations, trade unions and other groups, under the banner of MAKEPOVERTYHISTORY, which devised an intelligent three point campaign that targeted the government and linked dropping the debts of poor countries, increasing and improving the administration of aid and eliminating unfair practices and conditions in international trade in order to create a fairer international trading structure, and which also harnessed IT and PR to get its message across very effectively. Will we ever forget the horrendous

statistic of 30,000 deaths per day – a death every three seconds around the world from preventable causes?

Unsurprisingly, not all the political objectives of the MAKEPOVERTY-HISTORY Campaign or of the UK government could be attained, but there were impressive and unexpected achievements of 2005, among them:

- it was the year when justice and peace was taken to another level in terms of publicity and became 'credible' in political terms, J&P groups became recognised as 'opinion-formers' and public awareness and understanding around the country of justice and peace issues increased phenomenally;
- with the publicity of the Campaign and the government's stated objectives, came a 'drip down effect', a flowering of justice and peace activity and a lot of hard work in parishes all over the country, which clearly contributed to the impact of the Campaign all over the country, and
- visible links were forged between Christian social concern groups and other faith based groups, and between them and non-faith based ones.

The challenge for justice and peace groups in 2006 must be to build on the successes of 2005, and to sustain the pressure for the changes so imaginatively advocated by the MAKEPOVERTY-HISTORY Campaign and the government, but which could not be achieved during that year. Because public and political

attention may become distracted, it is likely the burden of that challenge will fall more upon local organisations such as church groups – a challenge that we should embrace because we are guided and sustained by the 'still small voice' of Faith, the teachings of the Gospels and the encouragement of the Church.

The start of a new year is the time therefore for creative reflection - individually, in our parish justice and peace groups, and in our Networks – on:

- Ø which of our efforts went well in 2005 and how we could most effectively take them on a stage in 2006?
- Ø whether we can adapt the experience of other justice and peace groups to motivate the involvement of others and to improve the effectiveness of our long term projects?
- Ø what new concerns have come to our attention, locally or more widely, that might lend themselves to group action in our parishes?
- Ø what ideas about activities or structural organisation could we share more widely with our Networks to make them more responsive to our needs and thereby increase the effectiveness of our efforts at a parish or Network level – or, (why not!?) at diocesan level?
- Ø what areas exist where ecumenical or joint action could be initiated or developed with local groups outside our parishes whose focus is also centred on the ideal of a world that is just and at peace?

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Herts J&P Network

The end of the year was busy, until Christmas put a stop to most J&P activities, though not to reflection and forward planning.

In St Albans, One World Week in October was inspiring, and it demonstrated how much the Churches have grown together in a spirit of solidarity, which embraces everyone as a neighbour, in our own community and beyond, regardless of religious, social, political or cultural divisions. It was a privilege for us from J&P to be involved in most of the events and activities. The exhibition in the Abbey highlighted connections of St Albans Churches, organisations and individuals with those less fortunate than us, particularly in developing countries. It attracted many visitors and many thoughtful comments. There were excellent talks every day, all well informed and stimulating. Particularly impressive were the talk by a Baha'i speaker who had been the UN development representative in Afghanistan between 1995 and 2004, and also the talk by local Rabbi Jonathan Gorski . Jonathan Gorski stepped in for a speaker who did not turn up, and spoke most

eloquently and lucidly about the problems of sub-Saharan Africa, and possible ways of improving matters. The yearly silent vigil was well attended, too, including our present and former MP and our mayor. The week-long Fairtrade stall in the Clock Tower, manned by members of 12 St Albans Churches, had many visitors, most of whom showed a surprisingly good understanding of Fairtrade – very encouraging. The message is clearly getting through.

As part of the MPH campaign a number of us in Hertfordshire lobbied our MPs in parliament on November 2nd, and many CAFOD cards were signed in support of MPH goals. The Wheathampstead J&P group continued their efforts for (rejected) asylum seekers and members were allowed to visit detainees in Yarlswood Detention Centre. Their work will continue.

The re-formed North Transept J&P Group at the Abbey is functioning now, with a co-chair from its sister group at St Bart's. Their next major project is a Fairtrade exhibition in the Abbey during Fairtrade Fortnight, to celebrate St Albans achieving Fairtrade City status. It is also very pleasing to report that a

new ecumenical J&P Group has started meeting in Boxmoor (Hemel Hempstead).

This month many of us are marking Peace Sunday and also Homelessness Sunday with prayers and actions. Peace, and the lack of it, has probably been preoccupying most of us during the last few months. Peace will also be at the centre of our annual Hert's J&P Network Event at St Edmund's in Ware on 18th February, 1-5pm. We are delighted that Bishop James O'Brien will join us, and we are looking forward to hearing our two excellent speakers, Fr Tim Edgar and Dr Valerie Flessati. If you would like to join us on February 18th, you will be most welcome.

2006 will bring many changes for the Commission and we are looking forward to working with Fr Joe. We are deeply indebted to Fr Pat for his guidance and support in the last three years. Without his untiring efforts the Commission would not have got off the ground. Thank you, Father Pat, and every good wish for a happy and less stressful year.

Pax Christi launch EU-wide contest for young people

Pax Christi sections in the UK, Germany, France and Flanders launched a contest yesterday inviting young people in school between the ages of 15 and 18 to produce a short power-point presentation.

The theme they are asked to illustrate is based on a speech of Martin Luther King: "We must learn to live together as brothers and sisters or perish together as fools". Yesterday was Martin Luther King Day, marking the birth and life of the civil rights leader and peace campaigner.

Students are invited to work in teams of four to produce a two-minute powerpoint presentation in CD format. This presentation is to be seen as the launch material for a campaign to raise public awareness of the theme. The deadline by which these must reach Pax Christi is 31 March 2006. The best teams from each country will meet together in Brussels in May for a short encounter visit which will include meeting some Euro MPs and a visit to the European Commission.
