Well over 500 people came to take part and from the written feedback we know that perceptions and lives were changed.

Equally wonderful was the sense of discovery that came for many as we unfolded the Church's best kept secret—its social justice teaching. But maybe best of all was the sense of achievement that we all felt. We had come as individuals from many organisations involved in social justice issues. We had come from Agencies and Departments of the Diocese and from other Christian Traditions. We left united and renewed in the knowledge that working for and promoting Christian social justice can bring people—the most unlikely people together.

Hanging out together was fun. Why not try it at your local level.

Around the Networks

West London J&P Network

The Network's meeting on 17 September was perhaps not as exhausting as the celebration of the England Cricket XI after regaining the Ashes in September, but it was pervaded by a similar sense of pride in having contributed to a job well done, following the success of the MAKE POVERTY HISTORY on 2 July, in Edinburgh and around the country.

After an introduction by Brother Bernard Elliot S.J. of the Jesuit Refugee Service to the predicament of the refugees and asylum seekers in our midst, there were reports from the ten parishes represented at the meeting of their summertime endeavours. These ranged from Our Lady and St Joseph (Hanwell) supporting a campaign to obtain permission for Mr Hossain Siavoshy, an Iranian citizen living in the parish, to remain in the UK, and also supporting an ecumenical workshop - while at the same time supporting a Filipino women's co-operative by a sale of cards made by them - to St Margaret of Scotland (East

Twickenham) participating in a Sycamore Tree programme for restorative justice for victim's held at Feltham Young Offenders Unit, and fundraising for a school in Lusaka, Zambia,

The representatives of Our Lady of Sorrows and St Bridget (Isleworth) told of their 'Pause for Prayer' on 2nd July at midday outside the church, and the release of helium filled white balloons (with prayers attached) by the children, to the pealing of church bells, and of their basic English classes in the Parish Hall for new arrivals in the country, their Fairtrade stall in the local hospital and their ingenious parish 'yellow pages' directory of local businesses, who pay £12 each quarter for the privilege of being listed!

Other parishes laboured with their pens, writing to their MP's about the new Asylum Bill, or the outcome of the Edinburgh G8 Summit in July, or Economic Partnership Agreements; while others laboured over stands in the open air at innumerable parish summer fairs, distributing literature, white MAKEPOVERTYHISTORY bands and Trade Justice balloons, in the midst of the frenetic world of jam competitions, Irish dancing and bric-a-brac stalls! So much individual vision and inaenuity!

The big opportunities for us till the end of the year are to help to inspire fellow parishioners during Season V of At Your Word, Lord, support the Mass Lobby of Parliament organised for the 2nd November by the Trade Justice Movement and also White Band Day III on 10 December organised by the MAKEPOVERTYHISTORY Campaign. Meanwhile, efforts continue to get behind the Fairtrade Foundation's push to certify Richmond, Ealing, Hammersmith and Hounslow as Fairtrade Boroughs.

In short, the focus is on all those 'numberless diverse acts' which, in the words of Robert Kennedy in 1966, send forth 'a tiny ripple of hope, [which] crossing each other from a million different centres of energy and daring ... build a current that can sweep down the mightiest walls of oppression and resistance'.

We also got involved in the planning for One World Week, which is organised here in St Albans by CTSA (Churches Together in St Albans), and the excellent programme of Church services and On 6th October the North Transept events that has emerged is likely to J&P Group (St Albans Abbey) will

bring together a wide cross-section of people of all faiths or none. In view of the EU and WTO meetings in December many of us hope to attend the parliamentary lobby of MPs on 2nd November concerning Trade Justice.

Plans for our annual Herts. J&P Network Meeting are well advanced. The meeting will take place on 18th February 2006 at St Edmund's College, Ware. Our two speakers will be Fr Tim Edgar and Valerie Flessati. The theme of the day will be "Seek peace and pursue it".

The countries are Benin, Bolivia, Burkino Faso, Ethiopia, Ghana, Guyana, Honduras, Madagascar, Mali, Mauritania, Mozambique, Nicaragua, Niger, Rwanda, Senegal, Tanzania, Uganda and Zambia. explicitly acknowledged the role played by campaigners in putting pressure on rich countries for debt relief. CAFOD said that it is a victory for campaigners and that the Trade agenda must now be addressed.

The event was called "Living Gospel Values". There was a marketplace where many Agencies displayed their literature. As well as the Faith Sharing books for Season V, there is an Action Pack containing ideas and suggestions for Justice and Peace activities to help groups to "Recreate the face of the earth and build the Kingdom of God", by bridging the gap between the rich and the poor in our world. We were urged to set up a Justice and Peace Group in every parish in the diocese and this is also the wish of Cardinal Cormac.

A small group of people can achieve a lot. The agreement at Gleneagles was achieved by groups such as these. The campaign to MakePovertyHistory is ongoing and Season V of At Your Word, Lord could be the beginning of something great in our diocese and a great contribution to the campaign.
